YEARS GONE BY MARCH

100 Years Ago – 1923

Dr. Pomeroy of Eastend went to Ravenscrag to attend to Mr. S. Rabourn of North Bench who received injuries in the recent storm,

Mr. Tony Klein returned from Rochester after receiving medical treatment there.

Frank Siemens of Ravenscrag, age 27 and employed by D. Corry at the clay pits just east of Ravenscrag, received fatal injuries as a result of falling rock and clay. Dr. Pomeroy was immediately called and the unfortunate man was taken to Corry's residence and died a few hours later. One of his team of horses was also killed.

As a result of a fracas which took place in the Pool Room and the discharge of a revolver therein, a man has been sentenced to 2 months of hard labour for the first event without option of a fine. On the second charge he received 1 month's imprisonment and a fine of \$50.

Climax is one of the best examples of a town "growing overnight". In February all that was on the site was a small homesteader's shack and a small barn. Since then there is a restaurant, 2 dwellings with 4 being in construction, 2 blacksmith shops, a drug store, general store, pool room and barber shop. All in preparation for the railway which will be laid into Climax in mid March.

The Eastend Dry Cleaners, located in the Pastime Theatre, is operated by George Ridler.

A banquet and dance were held at Echo Valley School to celebrate the arrival of the steel from Consul.

90 Years Ago – 1933

Mr. Charles Holmes, a farmer from the Brownville district south of Dollard, gave Grades 10-12 an interesting lecture on birds and bird life. (The Holmes planted over 30,000 trees over the years and I believe his farm was later the home of Evlyn and Arlene Hanson).

80 Years Ago – 1943

Pete Chourrout moved his cattle from his winter pasture in Dy Coulee district to his home ranch in Ravenscrag. He reports his stock are in very good condition and has not done any feeding up to date this winter.

Jim Kearney of Ravenscrag is now stationed at Lahore, in the northern part of India, with the RCAF.

70 Years Ago – 1953

Jim Armstrong, with the 57th Transport Co. Services Corp., left for Korea.

Miss Margaret Hall of Eastend received her RN training at Regina General Hospital and a theological course at the Bible Institute in Regina. She has been employed by the Zenana Bible and Medical Mission in India for several years.

A change in management at Youngberg's Hardware took place when Mel Marchbank and Ross Smith purchased the stock. The building was rented to them with the option to buy.

60 Years Ago – 1963

Mild weather has caused the postponement of two sports events, the mixed bonspiel and the ice carnival. Ranchers have reported seeing the odd robin wintering among their cattle. Mrs. Dunc McCuaig, Jr. has crocuses blooming in her garden – they appeared on Feb. 27th; previously the earliest date was the 17th of March.

The Pastime Theatre reopened after being closed for a couple of months. Art and Mrs. Mummery will again be on hand.

Kathryn Tittle of Consul won 1st place in the Bryant Oratory Public Speaking contest in Swift Current and went on to Moose Jaw where she placed 3rd.

The Kinette Ice Carnival was a success after being postponed earlier. The judges were Rev. and Mrs. M. Steinberg and Mrs. Shirley Gallup. The skating instructor was Mrs. Marlene Mellor assisted by Effie Beck.

The Eastend Jets, led by the three Sigurdson brothers, Bjorn, Tom and Allan and the unbelievable performance of Max Steinberg in the Eastend net, defeated Tompkins 8-5. Eastend will now move into the finals against Climax.

Motions passed at the Town Council meeting were for the construction of 2500' of sidewalk and a new addition to the Fire Hall.

At the Hockey banquet trophies were presented to Dwight Currie – rookie of the year and to Charles MacArthur – most valuable player.

Shaunavon Curling Rink was host to the District 4-H Bonspiel with 92 young people taking part. Eastend placed 2nd in the 1st Event with the team of Stewart Adams, Fred Duke, Ruth Wills and Kathy Stredwick. Placing 1st in the 2nd Event was the Brownville rink of Dwain Wills, Joyce Olson, Stan Olson and Garth Bascom.

The Eastend Amateur Show was held with 23 contestants from Eastend, Shaunavon, Ravenscrag and Loomis. The Gaylanders Orchestra from Instow also attended.

50 Years Ago – 1973

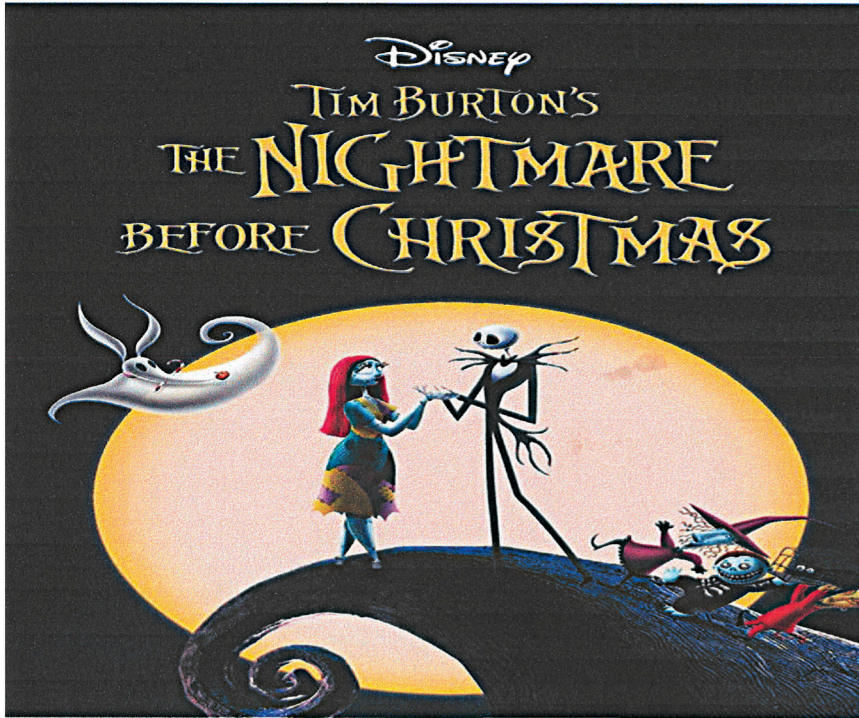
Demolition of one of Eastend's oldest buildings is being carried out under the Man Power Winter Works Program. This building was known as the Princess Confectionary and Café in the 1920's with rooms rented out on the second floor. In the 1960's, Mr. Antoine Beausoleil rented it for several years and operated a secondhand store there.

Two prominent Eastend men, O.B. Larson, 84 and Fred Bessie, 80 met death as the result of a tragic accident at Cypress Lake. Bessie's body was recovered from a small station wagon which had broken through the ice while the two men were on a fishing trip. O.B. Larson was found on shore some distance away from the lakeshore.

Doug Durrant spent a few days at home before returning to his job at Tuktoyuktue where he is working with a seismic crew out in the Arctic Ocean.

The prompt action by the Eastend Fire Brigade saved the Wilton's Garage when fire broke out in the front section.

reconciliations (training will be offered), Supply Management, etc

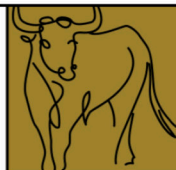

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DON'T GET CAUGHT BY AN ICE DAM ON YOUR ROOF

An ice dam is a ridge of ice that forms at the edge of a roof and prevents melting snow (water) from draining off the roof. The water that backs up behind the dam can leak into a home and cause damage to walls, ceilings, insulation and other areas.

Moisture entering the home from ice dams can lead to the growth of mold and mildew. These can cause respiratory problems.

Prevent the growth of mold and mildew by immediately drying out portions of the house that are wet or damp. Take immediate action to get rid of the water source, clean the home environment and maintain its air quality.

Good ventilation and proper insulation can also prevent excessive snowmelt on roofs

- Remove snow from the roof. This eliminates one of the ingredients necessary for the formation of an ice dam.
 - A "roof rake" and push broom can be used to remove snow, but may damage the roofing materials.

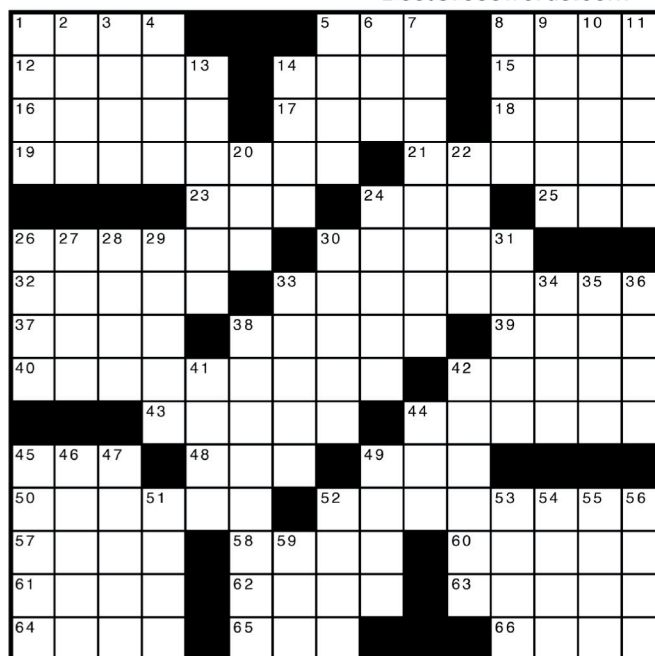
