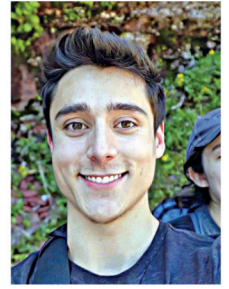
I have an extensive background in visual astronomy and astrophotography outside of the academic setting as well. I'm from Lethbridge Alberta and have also been a member of the Lethbridge

The Ride For Dad hit Eastend on Saturday, June 10. Over 100 bikers stopped to rest and refuel their bodies at the campground. It was a sea of chrome and colour. The Friends of Pine Cree and Eastend Light Horse Improvement Society were serving up hot meals and cold drinks.

## History of the Eastend Memorial Hall Complex

In 1946, the Eastend Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion voted to investigate the construction of a Memorial Hall. After inspecting Air Force buildings at Mossbank and Assiniboia, the Legion recommended a public meeting be held. At the meeting, the Eastend Memorial Hall Co-operative Association Limited was formed and a fund-raising drive started.

In June, 1947, the Town of Eastend purchased, dismantled and moved the Air Force Mess Hall from the bombing and gunnery range at the Town of Mossbank to Eastend.

By July of 1947, an agreement was made between the Eastend Memorial Hall Co-operative Association, the Eastend School District, and, the Eastend School Unit. The Eastend School Unit agreed to build a combined technical high school and community centre. The School Unit agreed to equip the high school, and the Memorial Hall Co-operative Association agreed to donate \$10,000.00 in return for a 99 year lease on the auditorium and club rooms.

In the spring of 1948 reconstruction began, and in September of 1948 the Light Horse Improvement Association held the first event, a dance, in Eastend's new Memorial Hall! The Memorial Hall was christened and has been the source of many community events since!

August of 1949 school classes started, thus marking the beginning of the Memorial Hall Complex!

In 1972, negotiations began between the Hall Board and the School Unit to divide the hall. A new school gym was built and after much discussion, the title was settled.

In 1975, the building was divided again, along the south corridor, with the School getting the woodwork shop and the Hall getting the old Legion room (now the Ranchmen's band room). The school still uses the stage for drama, oratory, and many other functions. Also, in 1975, the Chinook Regional Library set up in the north classroom of the main hall, the last installment of the Memorial Hall Complex.

In a major renovation in 1977-78, with the remodeling of the roof and washrooms, new wall coverings in the Tea Room and Main Hall, plus a new heating system. Renovations are constantly being made to improve its appearance, like the New Bar; and, with the need to keep up with changing standards; and, to maintain its heritage. At the time of this writing, it is celebrating it's 75th Birthday as Eastend's Memorial Hall Complex!

The Eastend Memorial Hall, has been a huge undertaking of which every member of the community can be proud of, and has been made possible by the united efforts of the whole community, and, it still relies extensively on the good will of the community to keep it going.

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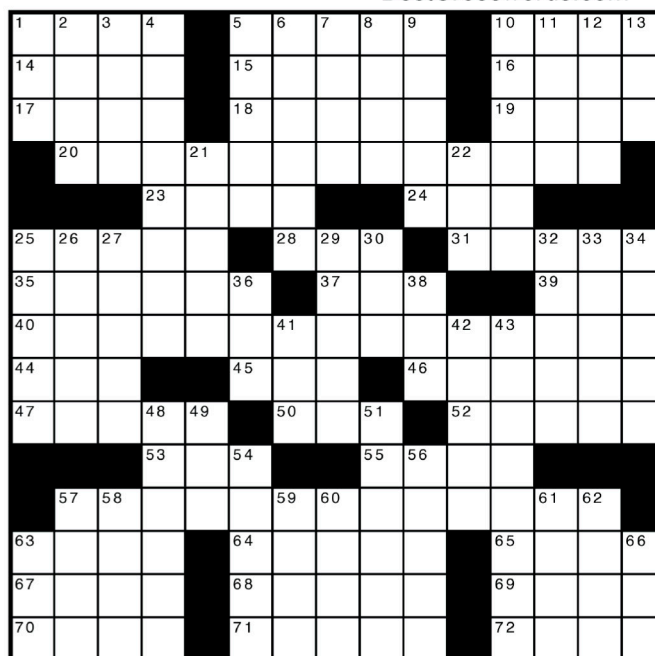

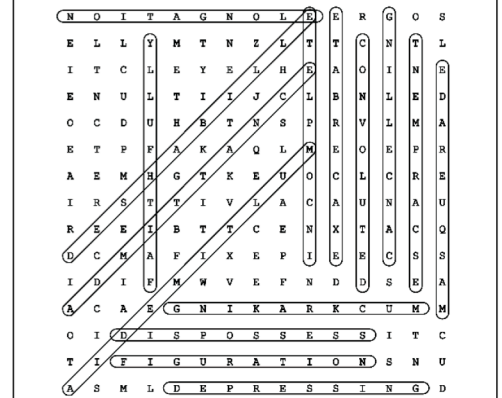
