HAPPY CANADA DAY 2023

This Friday is my favourite holiday of the year. Canada Day for me means "Summer". Is it ironic that on July 1 we're already on the downward trend of daylight hours, yet to me the date brings to mind the ideal "endless Summer" which I celebrate as if it will never end? Perhaps it's an apt metaphor for life?

EASTEND FLOOD MAPPING STUDY

Jaime Hogan from Water Security Agency and Ian Goeres from Ministry of Government Relations were in Eastend on Thursday to discuss the results of the flood mapping study which produced maps of the town of Eastend under the effects of "1 in 10" up to "1 in 500" floods, and showing what portions are more liable for flooding. The purpose of the talk was to enlighten Eastenders to the areas affected by the flooding models, and to encourage mitigation of damage through community planning. Community planning includes following all the guidelines agreed to by the government to withstand future climate calamity. That would include planning for a 1:500 flood in all future development in Eastend, restricting where one can build in town and to what standard to abide by the flood abatement experts. The recommendations from the evening were to in the short term, amend town bylaws to include 1:500 flood plain as a hazard land, avoid all new development in the floodway, and flood proofing any new development in the fringe zone. I have photos from the night inside. One thing I did learn that night was my misconception of the 1:10 and 1:500 year flood model. It is not meant to "directly" predict the amount of time between these great floods, rather every year there is a 1 in 10 chance we get a small flood, every year there is a 1 in 500 chance of a disastrous flood. It may not mean much of a difference, but one should always strive for precision when it comes to thought and communication.

- Short-term, the Town is encouraged to amend zoning bylaws to include 1:500 flood plain as a hazard land
- Avoid all new development in floodway, flood proofing for any new development in fringe
- Maps can be used to update emergency plans
- Provincial/federal funding available to pursue better flood protection or other mitigation options

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100 Years Ago - 1923

Mr. John Williams, oil and gas geologist of Calgary, spent a few days here making tests and is satisfied that gas will be found under Eastend. The territory, extending from near Knolly's on the west to Southfork on the east, has a distinct bearing of gas in the district adjacent to Eastend.

The site of the town of Eastend was in glacial and early post glacial times, occupied by a large river. The river was over a mile wide just east of town and sediments laid down denote a wide, shallow and sluggish river. With the retreat of the glaciers the river was reduced to a stream 20' across.

Thieves entered the Bank of Hochelaga in Dollard and got away with \$6700 cash and \$1000 in Victory Bonds.

A petition, signed by all the storekeepers, was presented at Town Council requesting stores be closed on Wednesday afternoons from June 1- August 15th and that stores remain open to the public until 10:30 Saturday nights.

After careful examination and testing by the U of S it was determined the most important and attractive clay of the Prairies occurs in the Eastend-Ravenscrag district.

The first drowning accident in the history of Eastend claimed the life of 4 year old Russell Hazzard. A search party was organized; the following morning the body was recovered by Angus Morrison and W.H. Wilton in the swimming hole west of town.

25 year old James Stephenson of Consul area died on his farm after poisoning gophers with strychnine. After autopsy was performed, it was believed that he carried the poison in his pocket and accidently mixed some with his chewing tobacco.

The general store built by Mr. R. Haddad of Echo is now completed and open for business with Norman Haddad in charge.

90 Years Ago - 1933

Arbor Day, on May 12th, is a day set aside for the planting of trees, especially around school grounds and public institutions.

In return for 5,000,000 pickerel eggs and a number of Hungarian partridges, the North Dakota government recently shipped 1,800 ring necked pheasants to the Gov't of Sask. to be distributed throughout the province.

Some Ravenscrag news: Mr. E.J. Olsen lost his glass eye and Mr. Andrew Goodhope (local farmer and veterinary) devised one from a glass saltshaker. He ground, polished and colored the glass to match the other eye. Mr. Olsen states it is quite comfortable and causes him no inconvenience. At a casual glance the false optic looks equal to one professionally made.

80 Years Ago - 1943

A welcome letter was received by J.E. Olmsted of Robsart from his son, John, who is a POW in Italy. John is in good health and allowed to write one letter per week.

Meat rations with the use of coupons has become necessary in Canada as over 40% of Canadian meat must now go overseas. Meat allowances for our armed forces, at home and abroad must be maintained.

Mrs. Jacob Bessie, age 34 yrs., passed away at the Shaunavon hospital after suffering terrible burns in a gasoline explosion at her home in Ravenscrag last October. Surviving her are her husband and 2 year- old son.

Trucks have been restricted to a 35- mile radius. Exceptions are made if one has a permit issued by Officer of Truck Control in Regina. Farmers hauling agricultural products from farm to town and supplies back to farm are not limited to the 35 -mile radius.

The mobile recruiting unit and medical board were in town recruiting for the active army who will report for duty within the month. Those recruited were Nelson Schmitt, Gordon Hazzard, J.W. Bissett, Joe Hunt, R.H. Goodhope and O. Lundsten.

Wilbur Dovell graduated as an air gunner with rank of sergeant in Manitoba.

After spending a few days at home he will leave for an eastern port.

70 Years Ago – 1953

George Buchanan of Claydon sold his property to Roger Dumontel.

Prizes of cash and shotguns have been offered by Sask. Fish and Game League for a competition to cut down the population of crows and magpies. For each pair of magpie legs turned in there is a bounty of 5 cents. An award will be made for the most legs turned in. Draw tickets will be issued for each 10 pairs crows and magpies and that ticket will entitle the holder to a draw on 6 shotguns. Only 1 gun awarded to any entrant, but an additional \$10 for repeat winners.

A paleontology camp will be set up at the Hazel Hunter Quarry at the Steward Ranch in May. The large deposit of fossil bones and teeth of animal life in Oligocene period is said to be the only one of its kind in Canada.

60 Years Ago -1963

The Eastend Ag Society are in the process of renovating the livestock corrals. Eleven pens, each capable of holding a car load of cattle, have been completely rebuilt.

The Eastend School District presented their 4th annual Drama Night. The Eastend play, "Star Child" was written and directed by Mr. A. Bauche. Star Child was the story of the murder of a RCMP constable; Vernon Hudson played the part of Jerry Potts and Louis Wig and Dwight Currie portrayed the convincing lawyers. The Frontier play "Jerry Breaks a Date" was directed by Mr. Keegstra. The Consul High School Choir sang directed by Mr. McLahan and accompanied by Mrs. Nadeborn. Inez Bessie gave her speech "Comments on Wolf Willow" with which she had won the Bryant Oratory contest for the Eastend District.

Larry MacWilliams, accountant at Eastend Bank of Montreal, is being transferred to Winnipeg. During his time in Eastend he has been a standout as an Eastend Jets defence man for the last two seasons. Replacing him is Al Fuchs of Rosthern who previously had worked here a few years ago.

A couple of new sidewalks are being built by Ingram and Rittinger Construction. One sidewalk is from the corner of the Catholic Church north to the Anglican Church. The other is from the Cub Hall to the hospital.

Maurice Larose, field officer with the PFRA in Swift Current, has been promoted to Regional Supervisor of Water Development for western Sask. Maurice is well known in Eastend having received his early education here and served with the RCAF in World War II.

125 people attended the grand opening of Citizen's Lumber's newly renovated office and improved yard facilities. Dave Neabel is the present manager of the lumber yard.

The Kinsmen Club is hosting "The Donkey Ball Show" from Oklahoma. There will be donkey ball, donkey races, flag race tricks and a bucking donkey riding contest by local riders – more fun than a barrel of monkeys – don't miss it!

Dr. Millions received an invitation to the High School graduation in Havre, Montana. Among the graduates are the triplet daughters of Mr. & Mrs. Albert Vasseur. The babies were born on July 7, 1945 in Eastend with Dr. Millions and the late Mrs. Howe, RN, in attendance. Mrs. Vasseur was the former Lucille Samoleski of Claydon.

Mr. George Shepherd, formerly of the Consul area, is having his book "The West of Yesterday" published by McClelland & Stewart.

V. Marchbank and C. Watson, electrical contractors in Eastend, amalgamated and are known as Cypress Hills Electric Ltd.

50 Years Ago – 1973

Mrs. Alice Metzger, early resident of Ravenscrag and long time storekeeper there, has passed away. She married Robert Whitefoot who passed away in the 1918 flu and then married George Metzger in 1922.

Librarian Mary Routledge and assistant, Edna Lajeunesse, report that over 500 books were lent out in April. The library also has a good selection of large print books.

Lynne Iverson and Lorne Friggstad of Frontier, attending Camrose school, have joined a singing group and will tour parts of Canada and the U.S.A. over the next 4 months.

Corky Jones Is Back

Long interested in Metis music, I was intrigued by a handmade fiddle I spotted in Brandon's biggest secondhand store. Metis fiddles were usually made of local materials, poplar or ash, covered with birchbark, tuned idiosyncratically and hung on the wall for safekeeping.

This fiddle was signed inside, H. S. Jones, Eastend, Saskatchewan, 1934. Many admired it but barring major repairs, it was not playable. Despite numerous attempts, it was not until I googled the Eastend, Saskatchewan Museum that I located its maker. Their response was immediate and enthusiastic; they would love to have the fiddle for their collection. Harold Saunders "Corky" Jones was well-known but mainly as a paleontologist, for example he had discovered the tooth of a three-toed horse. In 1905 he was given a Saskatchewan Golden Jubilee "Good Citizen Award" for his contributions to education in the Eastend area.

While Corky made this fiddle, was he inspired by his Metis friends? Did he play it, perhaps accompanied by his musician wife, Muriel Watkis? How did the fiddle make its way to Brandon, Manitoba? In any case, the museum staff is thrilled to place the violin along with Corky's other works, perhaps beside the Tyrannosaurus Rex. Don't miss it!

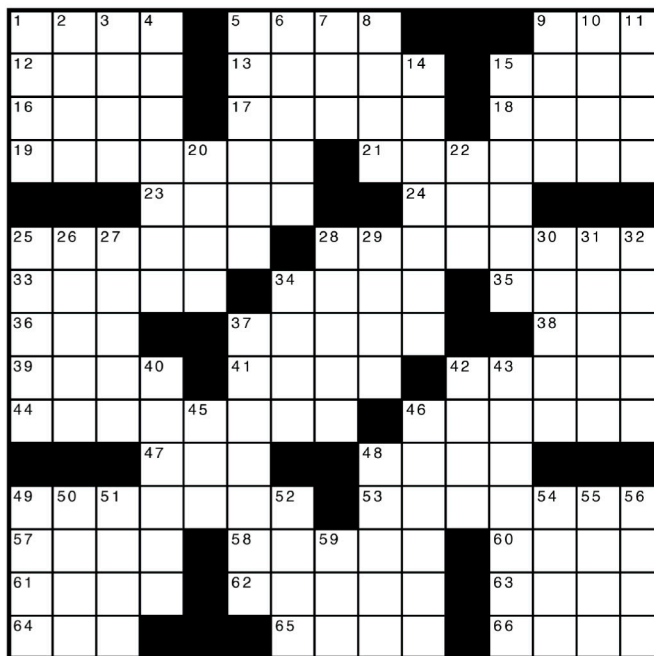
