2024 CHANGES TO SCI SERVICE LINE

HSB Canada currently offers SERVICE LINE coverage for homeowners to a limit of \$10,000 coverage for the service lines that connect a home to outside utility lines(underground: pipes, propane or natural gas lines, and electrical service and data lines) on the customer's property if any of those lines fail or are accidentally damaged.

Starting in 2024 at renewal time of existing home policies, the limit for any service line older than 50 years will be reduced from \$10,000 to \$2,500.

- If several service lines on the property are damaged in the same incident, a customer can make a claim of up to \$10,000, with a limit of \$2,500 each for lines that haven't been replaced for 50 or more years.
- This coverage limit is tied to the age of the service line, not the age of the home. If a line on the property was installed or replaced within the last 50 years, it may still be covered to \$10,000.



YEARS GONE BY: January 2024

100 Years Ago - 1924

Curlers open the season with a Free-for-all Bonspiel on New Year's Day; advertised as "Everybody curl! If business interferes with curling, cut out the business." Some 20 rinks entered in which a large proportion were "green" curlers.

A Climax poker game was robbed and the thief escaped with \$300. He has been caught and charged for robbery with violence and bail was fixed at \$5000.00.

Mrs. Thorvald Ovre, aged 22 yrs. of Echo, passed away at the Eastend Red Cross Outpost after an illness of 3 weeks. She leaves behind her husband and 5 year old son.

Eastend groceteria, "The Little Economy Store", advertises with Geo. Ridler as proprietor.

The Dep't of Health published rules for the safe cutting and storing of ice, for summer use, to avoid contamination.

A 36" bell, weighing 953 lbs. has been ordered from Toronto for installation in the Presbyterian Church. \$85 has been raised and the balance of \$65 will be raised by the Sunday school.

Ravenscrag Homestead No. 6403 advertises "The Brotherhood of American Yeoman" meetings twice a month.

Moonshine consumption resulting in blindness, etc. can usually be traced back to use of zinc or tin tubing and containers and not the ingredients used. If homebrew (liquid TNT) is going to be consumed ensure the use of copper utensils.

Securities stolen from Dollard bank were turned over by one of the bandits to a prominent Great Falls, MT attorney. He was known as the "fence" who disposed of thousands of dollars worth of bonds stolen on the Canadian side.

The new Union Church in Ravenscrag was dedicated and filled to capacity. The church is an up-to-date attractive building and credit is given to Mr. Manning whose workmanship is loudly praised.

80 Years Ago - 1944

The North Star service station, owned and operated by Jack Blair, has now passed into the hands of Alf Duke.

Sully Bengston has moved Ed Chatard's house (in 2 sections) from the North Bench to his farm.

A mortgage burning ceremony was held at the United Church. The church (1918) and the manse (1916) was built by Rev. Cookston who came to Eastend after building a college and home at Round Lake. Before the church was built, the first service of the

Presbyterian church was held over Anderson's Pool Hall and later services were at the Pastime Theatre.

Art Moir, Robsart farmer, has bought the land and buildings from Chas. Mah, market gardener east of town. The new owner will use the property as a feeding station and has acquired an additional quarter section, adjoining it on the north, to pasture cattle. Mr. Mah operated the hotel in Dollard prior to settling in Eastend over 20 years ago. By installing his own irrigation system he was successful in growing vegetables and his marketing extended as far as Moose Jaw and Regina. Due to health issues and lack of sufficient help, he has been forced to sell.

60 Years Ago - 1964

Waine Madson, mechanic at Eastend Co-op service station, topped a class of 120 taking a motor vehicle mechanical repair course at Moose Jaw Prov. Technical Institute.

One of the first SW women settlers, Mrs. Sarah (Harry) Otterson passed away. She came, with her husband, to the Frenchman Valley in 1906 where he was foreman of the T Down Bar ranch, located 6 miles SE of Eastend. Following the days of the open range, they established a ranch NE of Climax, also known as the T Down.

Mr. Byron Walters has retired after 43 years of serving as the Clerk of the Town and secretary-treasurer of the R.M. He was one of the first residents of Eastend in 1914 when it was only a few shacks and tents. A native of Nova Scotia, he loved the river and was a nephew of the skipper of the famous "Bluenose". Interested in education, he was the first principal of the Eastend Public School and an originator of the first Eastend Curling Club, curling in a converted livery barn. He also played an important part in the purchase of the buildings for the Memorial Hall. Succeeding Mr. Walters is Mr. G.A. Michelman.

Before moving to Beechy, Dr. N. Crux of Eastend held his last clinic in Consul.

50 Years Ago - 1974

Al Mulhern, agricultural representative, has moved his office to Shaunavon. His secretary, Mrs. Ethel Wills, will commute from Eastend to work.

John McIntyre, Pioneer Agent in Ravenscrag, has taken over the Ravenscrag Post Office from Stanley Hough who is now employed in Val Marie.

The White Mud is on the move again and trucks are busy hauling clay from 3 miles south of town and loading flat cars to be shipped to Regina. It is presumed that sewer drains will be manufactured.

Upcoming community college classes in Eastend are: typing, misc. crafts, conversational French, bridge, welding, re-upholstery and stretch and sew classes.

A Life Recognized

Bob's love for western history inspired him to purchase his first registered Texas Longhorn in 1983, starting a lifelong love for the breed. You could always find Bob taking grain to these cows in order to take their photos. He loved showing them in Calgary, Red Deer, Regina, and Saskatoon and won many awards throughout the years during his travels.

Bob was one of four founding members of the Canadian Texas Longhorn Association (and proudly hosted two field days). He was honored that day alongside Les Herman, Doris Boyd and Leonard Boyd of Alberta.

Bob was a leader and a mentor, he set an example for us all. He always had a twinkle in his eye and friendly greeting for everyone.

One of Bob's phrases he lived by was, "leave it better than it was before". He certainly succeeded at doing that.


