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100 Years ago – 1924

In Ravenscrag, Quong Tong has disposed of his hotel business and will soon be leaving. Two of his “cousins” are taking over the business.

Nearly 17,000 immigrants from Scandinavian countries are expected to arrive in Canada (about 10,000 Finns, 2,000 Danes, 2,000 Norwegians and 3,000 Swedes).

A party of 3 settlers arrived from Norway and have taken up residence with Torger Tysseland on his farm south of town.

An official from the Weyburn Mental Hospital paid a visit to Ravenscrag. He was carefully and skillfully piloted out of town, however, before he could deplete our population. We are all breathing more easily since his departure.

Two drowning fatalities occurred during the weekend at Ravenscrag. 3- year old son of Mr. & Mr. C. Gregory drowned in the dam on their farm when he attempted to walk on the newly formed ice. The next day the 3- year old daughter of Mr. Sharpe, station agent at Ravenscrag, fell into the river and was found deceased the next day.

A fire, swept by a fierce wind, burned a strip in the Olga district about 15 miles long and 6 miles wide. The Morton farm lost their barn, 9 head of horses and all the feed stored in the barn. The fire was within 2 miles of Claydon.

90 Years Ago – 1934

By amendment to the Farm Loans Board Act, the rate of interest on all farm loans will be set at 5% and deemed to have been set at the rate since Nov. 1, 1931.

80 Years Ago – 1944

Wanted: A capable, clean helper: good ironer and plain cook. No washing; help with cleaning, etc. Wages \$20/month. Apply to R. Howe, RN Matron of the Jubilee Hospital, Eastend.

Pete Chourrout and Hans Kunzli made a trip to Maple Creek by democrat to attend the horse sale. Pete took 3 horses over to sell but returned with them as prices were not good.

Farm land in RM of White Valley sold by public auction; highest priced quarters went to Arnold Strand for \$760, Elmer Evenson for \$850, Chester MacRae for \$800 and Graham Higgins for \$900.

The Bank of Montreal celebrates 25 years of service in Eastend. On April 9, 1919 it was opened for business here in a primitive building 24' square. James Houston was the first manager serving from 1919-1928. In 1920 the present modern brick office on Center St. was erected.

Miss Irene Willis, nurse with the US Army, has crossed the Atlantic and arrived safely overseas. Irene was raised on her parent's ranch, 7 miles NW of Eastend.

Stanley David, who has been attending agricultural college in Saskatoon, is home for the summer.

The first planks for a modest 20x24 building have been laid for the Scouts Hall located at the Legion Park in Eastend.

In the April 27th edition, Gundar Engleguarrd of Claydon has finished his seeding. This is the earliest we can remember.

70 Years Ago – 1954

The Swift Current Health Region reports 7 deaths from polio and 10 people suffering from permanent disability.

Joe Harrison and Alfred Pearson returned home after spending a couple of months in England.

Some 30 ranchers from Cypress Hills petitioned the Sask. Gov't asking for beaver to be trapped out of the Frenchman River as beaver dams are causing cattle losses through drowning. Nine trappers from the Sturgeon Lake Indian Reserve and 2 trappers from Choiceland are coming.

60 Years Ago – 1964

Mrs. Erma Sanderson is leaving Vidora and closing her coffee shop and store.

Michael Semchuk, Eastend, was one of the 12 Sask. students chosen to attend a course in horseshoeing in Swift Current, sponsored by the Sask. Riding Club

At the Eastend School Unit Board meeting, the board was advised of extra funds from the LID for improvement of school bus roads north of Ravenscrag and also from Ravenscrag to Eastend, on the northside of the Frenchman River. It was decided to close the Wallasey (Ravenscrag) School at the end of the term and transport students to Eastend. A contract to build a teacherage in Eastend was awarded to D. Lafrance.

Mr. & Mrs. Duncan McCuaig have enlarged their greenhouse and are having a grand opening in June. Their very able assistant is Mrs. Jennie McIntyre.

Mrs. Kalmbach, formerly of Eastend, passed away in Saskatoon. She lived in Eastend for about 15 years and operated a small dress shop in her home while living here.

A fire, of unknow origin near Southfork, destroyed the home of Mr. & Mrs. Roger Robichaud while they were away in Swift Current.

50 Years Ago – 1974

Robin Hood and his Merry Men took 1st place in the Eastend Ladies Novelty Bonspiel with skip Eileen Girard, Joyce Topham, Edlin David and Norma Lewis.

An organizational group for Eastend's 60th anniversary was held in Jack's Café with Father Bouchard as chairman.

The Eastend Square Dance Club held their roundup dance, with a record group of 12 squares of dancers, and enjoyed the yodeling caller, Wayne Thompson of Polson, Montana.

Mrs. Mabel Commodore of Eastend assumed the duties of matron at the Wolf Willow Lodge.

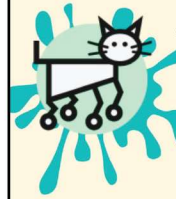

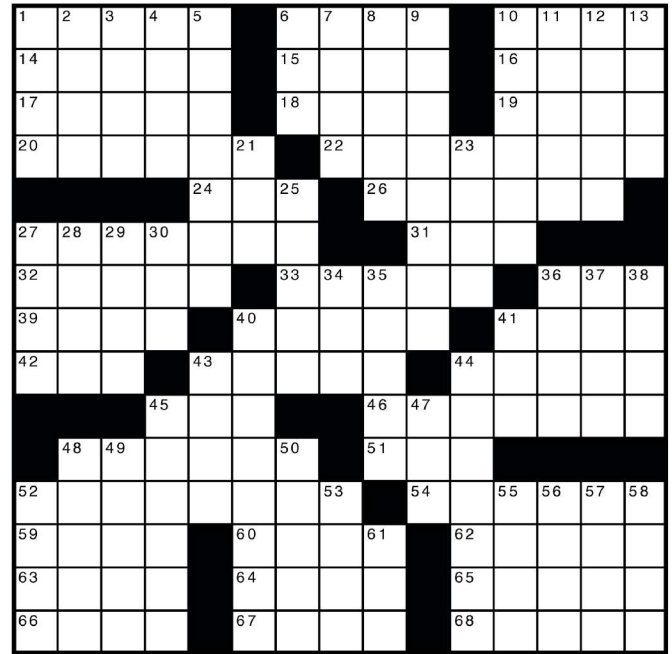


