

# YEARS GONE BY: June 2024

# 110 Years Ago - 1914

The first edition of the Enterprise was published on June 11, 1914. The subtitle for the paper was "The Garden Spot" and "East End for Industries". Interesting that Eastend is spelled both ways (Eastend and East End) but mainly as East End.

A bituminous coal, better quality than lignite, has been found in the Eastend area by Mr. J.R. Cassidy, late of Oregon and now a resident of Eastend. He was one of the first to purchase a lot at the original sale of the townsite and has spent hours in the hills enjoying his hobby – mineralogy.

Eastend has the first company incorporated in Sask. for the purpose of developing the natural resources of the province which have proved, beyond doubt, to exist in Eastend. It was registered as the East End Gas, Coal and Oil C. and agents are Whiskin & Stevens as well as being agents for the Eastend Townsite Co.

The clay here has been subjected to many tests and has proved equal to the best of any clay on the American continent.

Some of the business people who advertised in this first paper were: W. J. Bates – Physician and Surgeon; G.S. Thornewall -Veterinary; Wilton's Automobile Garage; Uglum Lumber Co.; Geo. Barr Lumber Co.; Merchant's Bank of Canada; Union Bank of Canada; McPherson & Youngberg – Hardware & Implements; East End Garage- Crawford & Jones; McLeod's Livery Barn; Eastend Livery Stable – Crawford, Clark & Thompson; Kelsey's Drug Store; East End Restaurant and East End Laundry both operated by Wong Chong; Premier Butcher Shop – Klein Bros; East End Meat Market by Waring & McNeal; Wright & Jickling; City Barber Shop & Billiard Parlor by Gatschene & Puckett; East End Barer Shop & Pool Hall with Anderson Bros. and others.

The Presbyterian Church held services every Sunday morning and the Methodist Church held services every Sunday evening in Anderson's Hall.

G. Wohlfahrt, a farmer living near Kealy Springs, was shot through the shoulder with a 44 caliber revolver by his neighbor, D.N. Overton, during a dispute over a fence.

Mr. Mummery of Gull Lake has accepted the position as electrician for Messrs. Daniels and Thompson who are building the East End Picture Palace.

Ballasting the track is in full swing. CPR has opened a pit 4 miles west of East End and are placing 5 trains on the job. Some 200 tampers are tamping ties and it is expected that the track from Shaunavon thro to Eastend will be ballasted in the near future.

The Better Farming Train (made up of 7 cars) is being sent all over Sask, by the Dept. of Agriculture and visited East End. Residents could tour the various carts and afterward informative lectures were given. One car contained a gasoline engine which was running a cream separator, washing machine, grain grinder and bone grinder all running from one shaft demonstrating the utility of cheap gasoline for farm use. Another car displayed useful models of farm buildings. There were 2 cars of livestock including a Clydesdale stallion, cows, sheep, Berkshire and Yorkshire sows as well as poultry.

The first birth recorded in East End was a daughter born to Mr. & Mrs. W.P. Anderson.

Mr. RV. Gregg's new house on his farm, adjoining the townsite, will soon be ready for Mrs. Gregg and family to come. (Later owned by Frank Rebbeck and still lived in).

At the sale of CPR townsites of Robsart and Vidora: 25 lots were sold at Robsart and 38 at Vidora with prices ranging from \$100 - \$250.

A group of East End ladies have gone camping, their tent was christened the "Crows' Nest". Two local baseball teams, the "Fats" vs the "Leans" played with a final score of 8-3 in favor of the "Leans".

# 80 Years Ago - 1944

Mr. & Mrs. Louis Arnal have moved into Ravenscrag having purchased the house formerly belonging to Harry Fisher.

Among the 31 Sask, volunteers awarded a Badge of Service by the Red Cross are three Claydon residents: Mr. G. Weighill, Mrs. H. Magee and Mrs. R. Sharpe.

After 34 years of service as veterinary inspector for the Health of Animals Branch, Dep't of Agriculture, ill health has forced Dr. Hugh Dixon to give up his position.

While playing the part of a clown at a Loomis sporting event, Henry Lutz suffered fatal injuries when throw from a steer and died in Frontier hospital without regaining consciousness. Burial took play in Eastend cemetery.

# 70 Years Ago - 1954

Helen Dowkes (Gilchrist) of Maple Creek will represent Sask. at the Junior Red Cross Rally to be held in Sweden in July. She is one of four girls from Canada chosen which also includes a tour of Europe.

### 60 Years Ago - 1964

Eastend Golden Jubilee (1914-1964) will have a rodeo and celebration on July13, 14, 15th.

The Elementary School Field Meet was held in Eastend with participating schools from Bentra, Claydon, Dollard, Eastend, Frontier, Mildred and Wallasey. High point went to Marilyn Arnal of Wallasey with 23 points and Stewart Tasche of Eastend with 21 points.

An open house was held at McCuaig's new greenhouse with about 150 attending. Tea was served by the United Church choir and after the ladies received a potted zinnia.

Rev. Graeme Mount of Montreal is replacing Rev. Steinberg who has accepted a call from Sydenham, Ontario.

Three men have been recognized as making outstanding contributions to the educational and cultural developments of the area served by the Eastend School were Mr. Everett Baker, Mr. Corky Jones and Mr. George Shepherd.

Swimming lessons will start in July with Mr. Severson as the instructor.

Superintendent Mr. Don Ferguson and family has taken another position and is moving to Weyburn after serving Eastend for the last 6 years.

Mrs. Bob Hickerty's nineteen young music students had a recital in the United Church basement.


