1914 to 1980

YEARS GONE BY: June - July

## 110 Years Ago - 1915

A Gun Club was formed in Eastend with Gen. Stegner as the captain.

Dollard Hotel advertises with T.F. St. Hilaire as owner and G.R. Binkley advertises as funeral director and embalmer.

Military horses are wanted for Canadian Government riding, artillery and heavy draft horses. No light greys or whites. Horses will be inspected in Robsart and Eastend.

Kelsey's Drug Store in Eastend advertises Welch's Grape juice as the national drink.

The new fire bell was erected over the Hall last week in readiness in case of an outbreak.

2nd Street opened up by placing a substantial bridge over the irrigation ditch; opening the street up from Railroad St.

## 100 Years Ago - 1925

Messrs. A. Leslie, Robert Whipple and A. Wilcox were away organizing new Yoemen lodges on the south line. After the meetings, the Whipple Bros. provided free music for the dances.

It is reported that 2 new steel bridges will be built by the CPR over the river east and west of town. This will greatly improve the train service during the spring due to the weakening condition of the present pile bridges.

After a full week of Chautaugua entertainment the crowd for the Stampede was meagre. The rodeo was organized by Laframboise (better known as Mexican Pete) and Ed Kealey. Judges are Earl Kennedy and Sam Gordon.

Horsemanship clinics, in Ravenscrag and Eastend, were held by H.R. White whose methods of handling unbroken horses and taming them by common sense methods are spoken of in the highest terms. One of his first principles to learn are that a horse never hurts a man first until man hurts the horse first.

The Better Live Stock Train came to Eastend with exhibits of livestock carried on the train. Purebred bulls, swine, draft horses, sheep, etc as well as a car of fodder displays, a lecture car, a forestry car and a motion picture car for a total of 19 cars.

Hungarian partridges were first seen in the area about 5 years ago. Large flocks have been reported and many localities report their presence in the entire western part of the province. Sportsmen may soon be allowed to hunt them.

Bench Post Office has been authorized and will be located at the A. Kopitoski farm near Crossfell School.

Contracts have been awarded for erection of Wheat Pool elevators in Ravenscrag, Senate and Shaunavon. South Fork is booming; 8 lots were sold last week.

The development of clay in the Knolly's district has been taken over by International Clay Products of Regina after buying a half section of land near Knolly's.

## 90 Years Ago - 1935

Ira Kendrick, an Eastbrook farmer, lost his 40'x26' hipped-roof barn to fire. This is the second barn he has lost, the first in 1916 when a cyclone destroyed his 80' long barn.

A group of pictures, recalling when the townsite of Eastend grew oats and other fodder, was

reproduced with the consent of Mr. L Egland from his originals. They depict the building of irrigation ditches from Strong's dam; ditches filled with water running through the townsite; the flume conducting water over the river, the dam, the hay flats and pictures of Mr. and Mrs. Strong and Mr. Enright. At the request of Hon. R. Weir, the federal Minister of Agriculture, these pictures have been forwarded to him in Ottawa.

Petitioners, seeking an option to vote over sale of beer by the glass in licensed premises have been successful. Eastend has been the only centre around where active opposition has taken place. 198 Eastenders voted (out of 234) with 134 in favor of selling beer by the glass and 64 against. Mr. Desilets, proprietor of the Whitemud Tavern, will build an addition to the hotel on the east side to accommodate a beer parlour.

The Boy Scouts of Robsart, led by Allan Hogg, left for their annual week of camping at Elkwater Lake.

#### 80 Years Ago - 1945

Eastend's 4th Annual Baby Beef Day was held with about 60 calves. The top price was 20 cents a pound and the low was 14 cents. In the senior section, Dorothy Hodgson had Grand Champion and Gerald Avison had Reserve Champion. In the junior section Ellen Studer was first and Shirley Taylor second. Nancy Willan took 1st in the open class and 2nd went to Mont Taylor.

The new government veterinary at Shaunavon is Dr. J.T. Thompson who has replaced Dr. Hugh Dixon who resigned due to poor health.

Sully Bengtson left for Hazlet where he is moving a large barn into the village to be converted into a community hall.

Dr. Millions made the last of 5 trips to Senate to inoculate and vaccinate 125 children. The community club sponsored the clinic and paid \$300 for the service.

The Eastend Cemetery Improvement League installed a cistern and pump so that plants and flowers can be watered.

After residing in this area for 40 years, Miss Potter is moving back to England.

Mrs. Albert Vasseur of Claydon gave birth to triplet girls at the Eastend Hospital. Attending the delivery was Dr. Millions.

The Lindner Bros. ranch, one of the largest and best spreads in the Cypress Hills district, was sold to Bob and Henry Mitchell, well known stockmen of Medicine Hat and Maple Creek.

#### 70 Years Ago - 1955

Cutworms have infested approximately 10,000 acres in an area from Val Marie to Consul, most being south of the Frenchman River. Dr. H. McDonald of Saskatoon toured the area and a count at Sig Giverhaug's farm showed an average of 6 worms per square foot from a total of 20 counts.

Mr. Andrew Lindsay's farm home has been moved to town on the Ed Wright property. Lindsay's will reside in their home after doing renovations.

Grade 12 graduates are Karen Arendt, Carol Brown, Morris Girard, Paul Radomski, Lela Duke, Hazel Holmberg, Anna Holmberg and Raeann Lewis.

Dr. R. W. Sutherland and Dr. E.W. Sutherland have opened their office in the Credit Union.

#### 60 Years Ago - 1965

Highway #13 between Eastend and Robsart will be rebuilt on a new route. It will approximately follow the present route but will shorten the distance by 3.5 miles.

Constable Robert Doig and family of Winnipeg have taken over the policing for Eastend.

43 preschool children, who will be going to school in Eastend in the fall, attended a pre-school clinic in Eastend.

Mr. Laurence McNabb from Sandwith, Sk has replaced Ted Youck as the new Ag-Rep in Eastend.

Ross and Glen Smith have opened their Hardware and Furniture store in Eastend. They purchased the store from Ed Youngberg in 1955 and last year decided to enlarge it to include furniture.

Eastend's new post office opened with Henry Tasche, the post master, in charge of the change over. The Town has purchased the old post office for their offices and Constable Doig will have his office above the Town Office.

Mr. Oliver Brown, CPR agent at Eastend from 1949-1955 retired after 45 years of service.

Mrs. Mary Peterson, public school teacher in Eastend, has accepted a position near her home town of Shackleton.

Men's Barrel racing at the Eastend Rodeo was won by John Armstrong with a time of 194; Guy Thompson and Arnold Mackie split 2nd and 3rd went to Allen Moorhead with a time of 23.2. Ladies Barrels was won by Rita Wells with a time of 19.1.

Eastend was the location of Fly-In for the Sask. Flying Farmers; over 35 planes landed at the airport.

### 50 Years Ago – 1975


A farewell was held for Sharon and Harold Liick who are moving to Swift Current where Harold will join the staff at the Comprehensive School.

Pauline Fandrich announces the Closing Out Sale of her clothing, fabric and yarn store in Eastend.

Henry Tasche retires after being Eastend's post master for 25 years. He taught in Frontier before coming to Eastend in 1934 as vice principal. He enlisted in the RCAF, was a Navigation Officer in Ireland and returned to Eastend in 1946 where he was Secretary Treasurer for the Eastend School Unit until becoming our Post Master in 1950.

7 teachers have resigned from the Eastend School. They are Donna Busse, Bernice Hamrin, Candy Adam, Sharon Girard, David Hawley, Harold Liick and Lynn Waters.

The Eastend Meal on Wheels served its first meals with Wolf Willow Lodge preparing the meals on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.



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
